the National book Committee in 1954. committee's goals were ambitious. They ranged from "encouraging people to read in their leisure increasing time" "improving incomes and health" and "developing strong and happy family life." In 1957, the committee developed a plan for National Library Week based on the idea that once people were motivated to read, they would support and use libraries. With the cooperation of ALA and with help from the Advertising Council, the first National Library week was observed in 1958 with the theme, "Wake Up and Read!"

National Library Week was observed again in 1959, and the ALA Council voted continue the annual celebration. When the National Book Committee disbanded

1974, ALA assumed full sponsorship.



Did you know?... Cyrus Loomis was the Commander of the Loomis The cannon in Battery Park Battery. in Coldwater is the only surviving cannon of the original six cannons that belonged to the Loomis Battery. It was the only one never captured and used against our forces. story goes that a Loomis Battery soldier hitched the cannon to "Sam", the only surviving horse of the battery who had pulled the cannon to safety. All six of the cannons used to be on display at Battery Park, which included the area where the United Methodist Church is located. Five of the cannons were sold for scrap metal but the sixth one is on display at the four corners in Coldwater.
