Community effort defines SOW

QUINCY — Sows are hard at work in Quincy these days.

More precisely, sows are hard at work in the Quincy Middle School. What's more, they are looking for additional sows to join them in an ambitious project designed to improve the appearance of the school's interior.

The project is titled "Save Our Woodwork" or, simply, "SOW."

Participating in SOW is a commit-

tee of hard-working volunteer workers. Sparking the formation of the committee were Mary Gale, geography teacher in the middle school, and Mary Ellen Newton, a teacher in the Jennings Elementary School here.

The committee was formed shortly after the Quincy Board of Education, earlier this month, hired the Docsa-Smith Construction Company of Kalamazoo to make major renovations to the middle school's interior.

THE RENOVATIONS are part of a \$564,000 construction project planned for the Quincy school district. The

project includes the construction of a major addition to the Jennings school.

The renovations to the middle school will cost \$101,000. However, the rehabilitation to the interior does not include any restoration of the woodwork (such as paneling, doors and doorways) of the 58-year-old building, which once housed the school district's elementary school, junior high and high school.

The woodwork is of oak; it is of rare quality and a serious attempt should be made to restore it to its original condition, insists Mary Gale.

DOCSA-SMITH said it would refinish the woodwork but at an additional cost of \$14,000. The refinishing would entail removal of the old varnish, cleaning the woodwork and then revarnishing it.

An alternate proposal by Docsa-Smith, which would cost an additional \$4,200, was to apply a coat of paint to the woodwork, with no provision being made to restore it.

On learning of the alternate proposals submitted by the contractor, Gale and Newton quickly got to work. They contacted other teachers and concerned citizens in the community and SOW was formed.

Committee members have been working diligently on the "save our

woodwork" project since last Monday. They work each day from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 3:30 p.m. As of Wednesday of this week, 14 different volunteers had put in 80 hours of work on saving the woodwork in the middle school, according to Gale and Newton.

HOWEVER, additional volunteers are urgently needed and they are needed as soon as possible, in order to finish the job before the renovation project by the Kalamazoo construction firm begins early next month.

Preserving the woodwork in the middle school is a painstaking job but it's also "a labor of love," says Gale. Her fellow SOW members agree wholeheartedly.

There's also a practical side to the project, she adds, since it provides property owners with a chance to learn a skill that they might some day be able to put to good use in their own homes.

IN ADDITION to the woodwork, the volunteer workers also plan to restore a walnut desk, which is the same age as the middle school building.

Local residents who think they might have the time and wish to help in the project, should contact Gale or Newton. They can also simply show up in the middle school during the hours when the SOW volunteers are working.
