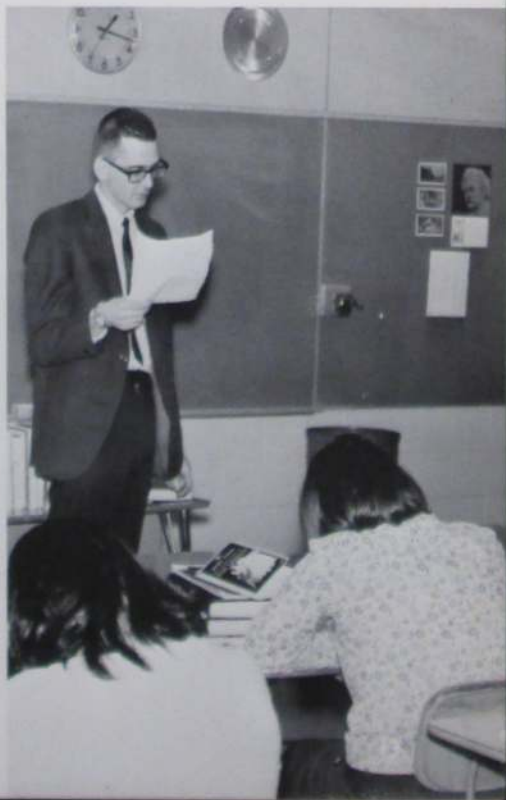

Most knowledge involves Math. This statement, proves the importance of Bronsons' Mathematics Courses.

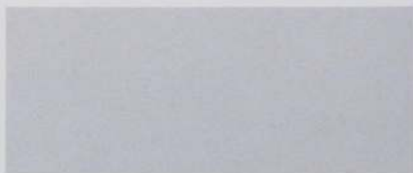
Geometry, offered under instruction of Mr. Cottrell, is designed to stress the study of planes, solids, and theorems.

Algebra I and II, are instructed by Mr. William Zabonick. Algebra I covers solving problems through usage of variables. Algebra II, first semester is a review and then develops the study of logarithms; partial trigonometry; relationships. A Trig course is offered to advanced Seniors.

General Math is a review of basic arithmetic operations. It is open to any who missed fundamentals in Jr. High. It is taught by Mr. Scully, Mr. Whitcomb, and Mr. Cottrell.

Shop math instructed by Mr. Zabonick is primarily a course for students planning shop work as a trade. Usually, the pupils are taking other shop classes. The material is presented so as to be related to shop work.

It may be considered mandatory that everyone who graduates should have had at least one math course in high school. An individual without at least slight knowledge in math will soon be considered handicapped in our society,

To help prepare students to keep up with the space age, many science courses are open to B.H.S. students. By combining the latest research with proven theories of the past, our teachers help pupils to develop a sense of investigation, experimentation, and assimilation of facts.

Biology and Advanced Biology are offered to students. Biology I is for the student interested in seeing the basis behind science. The Advanced course is for pupils interested in furthering their Biological knowledge. It is designed as a college-prep course. Both subjects are taught by Mr. Jordan.

General Science is taught by Mr. Atkocunis and is an elective course.

Physical Science and Chemistry, taught by Mrs. Shoun, are the study of substance composition and transformation of such. It is an introduction to both Chemistry and Physics. Both classes are enjoyable courses for the college bound.

Mr. Cottrell teaches Physics to seniors who are interested in the development and science of matter and energy and their relationship.

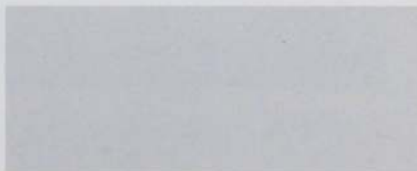
Most students in these more advanced courses show a high aptitude and interest and can easily fall back on these subjects if interested in a college education.

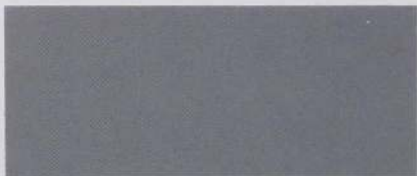

This years new Agriculture teacher is Mr. Sullins. He helps prepare the boys for a future in the agriculture world.

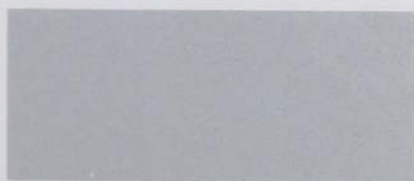

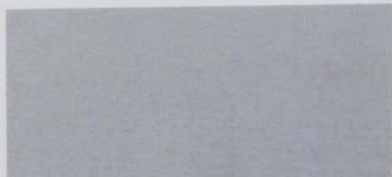
In its concern for the physical fitness of the student body, our athletic department requires all freshmen to participate in physical education.

The educational goal which the Bronson Commercial Department strives to achieve for its students is to prepare them for college, business or academics. For those who do not attend college, to train them for immediate employment.

The educational goal which this department strives to achieve for the community is to prepare the students to take their place in a progressive, social, and industrial community and world.

The purpose of instruction is to teach the students principles, ideas, skills, and to have them think and reason for themselves in solving daily problems. 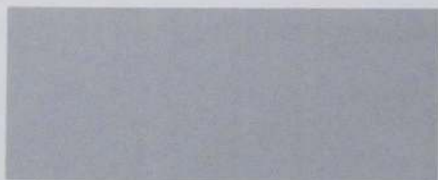

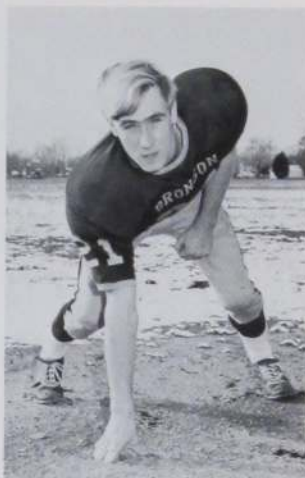
