'You've Got the Look'





By the end of ten days, students realized how much time and care babies need, and most decided they didn't want one for a long time.



200 Years . . . Still Grand

Students, faculty, and a familiar face in the halls, Sonny Dailey, participated in a special assembly held in honor of the 200th birthday of the Constitution of the United States.

Each participant read one section of the Constitution before an attentive, respectful student audience, while the great document was read in its entirety.

Afterwards the band and choir presented

two special numbers, and Circuit Court Judge Michael Cherry related the Constitution's effects on the lives of students throughout the past 12 years.

This unique experience reminded students of the greatness of this amazing document and the awe of its effectiveness even 200 years later. "200 years may not seem like a long time as nations go, and it's a mere flicker of the eye in the history of the world, but it is remarkable that we have had the same frame of government, unchanged, that long. No others are that old and unchanged," said John Kessler.

"The Constitution begins with, 'We the people . . . and that is everyone who wants to be a part. All may speak their mind, write and publish their opinions, meet for public debate, vote for their choice, and worship the way they choose. We the people — that's me and YOU!'" added Kessler.

"You could do few things more important in your lifetime than helping to maintain and

improve your Constitutional System so that your children and their children could continue to reap the benefits. We have much to celebrate," said Ken Johnson.

"Our Constitution is the yardstick by which all our laws are measured and it remains as important as ever," remarked Judge Cherry. "New cases continue to show its remarkable ability to protect the rights of the individual, and to meet the needs of our society."




Fun And Games









'MIRROR' TELLS ALL



Although the seniors will be missed next year, *The Mirror* will continue with still more great and exciting issues of the day.







Band has been a fantastic experience. I wouldn't trade it for anything.







Every member of the 1987 varsity team earned recognition for their hard work and effort during the season.






Eight qualified for Districts, while Brian Owens and Jason Nowicki went on to Regionals, and were also named Twin Valley Champs.






Making Progress


The future looks bright, especially with Andy Schorfhaar, who led with 15 points per game, and 20 rebounds in the first three.




Ronda Hoopgarner and Beth Conant, the only two competi-




