As we look forward to this new year ahead, we can't help but be grateful for all we have. The Branch District Library System includes the Coldwater Library, as well as branches in Quincy, Algansee, Bronson, Sherwood and Union Township.

Our Quincy Branch Library serves, on average, 74 people per business day (15,600 last year) and offers many items, programs and services to our community. Over 4500 people benefited from our free Internet service last year and over 17,500 used the wireless capability from within and outside our building. This wireless service is available 24/7. Over 2500 books and materials were loaned and borrowed from outside our library district system (within the state of Michigan) and 23,700 items circulated from our Quincy Library!

Library Board Update

It has been a while since you've heard from the Board so some of this info reaches back a bit.

The removal of the two trees at the library has certainly opened up the front of the library so the landscaping was more noticeable this year. Comments are running about equal – some like the look just as it is and some miss the trees. The Board is looking into replacing the trees with small ornamental ones that don't bear fruit.

A write up about the Quincy Library has been submitted for inclusion in the 3rd Branch County History Book being compiled.

The Nika Club of Quincy donated over \$1500 from their annual auction that supports the library.

The library continues to run smoothly but monies to run all the libraries are down and District has asked each library to cut their hours open to 25, the number allowed in the Plan of Service. The board voted to go to the following hours as of January 1, 2012:

At our December meeting, Lisa informed the board that the library had received a \$4000 donation from Andy Zeck in memory of his sister, Susan Zeck. This donation is to be used for a need at the library and we continue to be amazed at the generosity of those who have a connection with the library – either at present or from the past.

It was noted that during the 2011 ice storm early in the year with all the power outages, the library was a warm and entertaining place to be. I think it should be noted that the library is a comfortable place to be no matter what the temperature or time of year. Please come in and learn to use all of the services available.

National Library Week

We all know about the National Library Week, but many of us do not know how or when this event started. Below is a bit of the history behind this week. In 1954 the American Library Association and the American Book Publishers formed the National Book Committee as a non profit organization and the group started to plan for the first National Library week. In 1958, the committee's work was finally recognized and the first National Library Week was held with the first theme of "Wake Up and Read!" From then on the National Library Week was held typically the second week in April. In 1974, the National Book Committee was disbanded and the ALA assumed full sponsorship of the program.

Many school libraries celebrate the whole month of April as School Library Month which is sponsored by the American Association of School Librarians, which is a division of the ALA.

Below is schedule of events for this year's National Library Week which will be April 8 - 14, 2012.


Monday, April 9 - 2011 State of America's Report released
