Clarification:

A previous tidbit of information was not entirely correct in the statement: "The Titanic was the first ship to use the S.O.S. signal. It was adopted as the international signal for distress in 1912 and the *Titanic* struck the iceberg in April of that year."

The first use of wireless in communicating the need for assistance came in March of 1899. regulations, effective April 1, 1905. The East Goodwin Lightship, marking the southeastern English

coast, was rammed in a fog in the early morning hours by the SS R. F. Matthews. A distress call was transmitted to a shore station at South Foreland and help was dispatched. By 1904 there were many Trans-Atlantic British ships equipped with wireless.

The Marconi Yearbook of Wireless Telegraphy and Telephony, 1918 states, "This signal [SOS] was adopted simply on account of its easy radiation and its unmistakable character. There is no special signification in the letter themselves. and it is entirely incorrect to put full stops between them [the letters]." All the popular interpretations of "SOS," "Save or Ship," "Save Our Souls," or "Send Out Succour" are simply not valid. Stations hearing this distress call were to immediately cease handling traffic until the emergency was over and were likewise bound to answer the distress signal.

Although the use of "SOS" was officially ratified in 1908, the use of "CQD" lingered for several more where it originated. It is well documented in personal accounts of Harold Bride, second Radio Officer, and in the logs of the SS Carpathia, that the Titanic first used "CQD" to call for help. When Captain Smith gave the order to radio for help, first radio officer Jack Phillips sent "CQD" six times followed by the Titanic call letters. "MGY." Later, at Brides suggestion, Phillips interspersed his calls with "SOS."

The first ship to transmit an SOS distress call appears to have been the Cunard liner Slavonia on June 10, 1909. The use of the SOS signal was first introduced in Germany as part of a set of national radio

From the Quincy Herald newspaper – August 18, 1910

"Received Fine Set of Books"

"Work on the Quincy Public Library is now far enough along so that a very good idea can be had of what the building will be when completed. In fact, it is even going to surpass in beauty and design the plans and expectations of the members of the Township Library Board who have given so freely of their time and attention in perfecting a structure of which our people may well be proud. Quincy township was, indeed, fortunate in having had in the past a resident who thought enough of this former home to make the contribution that he did for the present and future educational advancement of the community. Through the patient but effective efforts of the Ladies' Library Association, the township already possesses a fine and admirable selection of books, treating of religion, history, romance, biography, criticism, poetry, science the drama down from the latest advertised and additions to the realm of fiction. And the selection has now been further increased and benefitted by a valuable gift from Congressman Gardner, consisting of the only complete, accurate and detailed history of the Civil War. This history is composed of 124 large volumes, averaging 1000 pages to the volume and was compiled from the government war records under jurisdiction of the War department. General Longstreet, speaking a few years ago of this history, said it was the only complete one of the great Civil War. In order that the public may better appreciate the voluminousness of the books, Mr. E.K. Pearce has the whole 128 volumes in the window of his dry goods store for a few days."

Do You Love Your Library?

There are 383 main libraries, 261 branch libraries and 11 bookmobiles that provide public library service in Michigan.

Within the state, there 33,741,536 print materials available, 1,227,898 eBooks, 584,889 eAudio, 1,923,437 audiobooks and music, and 2,253,851 videos available to the public.

National Library Week Events

<u>National Library Workers Day</u> - April 15, 2014 (**Tuesday** of National Library Week): <u>http://ala-apa.org/</u><u>nlwd</u>

The American Library Association-Allied Professional Association (ALA-APA), the organization for the advancement of library employees, annually sponsors National Library Workers Day, which falls on the Tuesday of National Library Week. First celebrated in 2004, the purpose is to recognize all library workers, including librarians, support staff and others who make library service possible every day.

National Bookmobile Day - April 16, 2014 (Wednesday of National Library Week): <u>http://</u>www.ala.org/bookmobiles

First celebrated in 2010 by the American Library Association Office for Literacy and Outreach Services (OLOS), the Association of Bookmobile and Outreach Service (ABOS), and the Association for Rural & Small Libraries (ARSL). National Bookmobile Day is an annual celebration of the contributions of our nation's bookmobiles and the dedicated professionals who make quality bookmobile outreach possible in their communities.

<u>Celebrate Teen Literature Day</u> - April 17, 2014 (**Thursday** of National Library Week)

First celebrated in 2007 by the Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA, a division of ALA) under its original name, Support Teen Literature Day. The purpose of the renamed (starting in 2013) Celebrate Teen Literature Day is to raise awareness among the general public that young adult literature is a vibrant, growing genre with much to offer today's teens as well as showcase some award-winning authors and books in the genre as well as highlight librarians' expertise in connecting teens with books and other reading materials.

Preservation Week - April 27-May 3, 2014

Preservation Week, first observed by the Association for Library Collections & Technical Services (ALCTS) in 2010, offers an opportunity to celebrate collecting and preservation in your community, and to highlight your institution as a source of preservation information.

<u>Children's Day/Book Day</u> - April 30, 2014: <u>http://</u> <u>dia.ala.org</u> Children's Day/Book Day is a celebration of children, families, and reading and held annually on April 30. The celebration emphasizes the importance of advocating literacy for every child regardless of linguistic and cultural background. Through several grants from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the Association for Library Service to Children (ALSC) continues to increase public awareness of the event in libraries throughout the country. Children's Day was designated as a day to bring attention to the importance and well-being of children.
