From the Quincy Herald newspaper - April 1916

Letters From our Juvenile Friends, With Good Suggestions Quincy, Mich., April 13, 1916

Dr. Mr. Owen: - I think that the lot on the corner of west Jefferson and Pleasant streets can be improved. The lot is full of weeds, tin cans and ashes and is rather unsightly. If it was seeded with grass and flower beds were put in it would be very pretty indeed. Your efforts will be appreciated. Yours respectfully, Lucile Joseph

Dear Mr. Owen: - The Chicago road west of Quincy to the state road is badly in need of repairs and it seems to me the condition of same ought to be shown to the highway commissioner. The road is very wet, low and full of chuck holes and is liable to cause accidents if not fixed. A little work on this road would put same in good passable condition. Your efforts in our behalf will be appreciated. Yours respectfully, Lillian Kohl

Dear Mr. Owen: - I wish to make an appeal through your paper for better train service to the public. In a place the size of Quincy more trains should stop on Sunday. The only train we have going east that stops here are the 6:17 a.m. and 8:22 p.m. The service on trains is very poor. When we came to Quincy we had an invalid. The train stopped at the station so short a time that we didn't have time to get off. It started up again and we would not have gotten off had it not been for a man who told the conductor to stop the train. They had to stop again, but it was at the crossing. If they had stopped longer the first time it would have saved time. It would be a great convenience and more pleasure for the people traveling in and out of this town if they would stop longer. April 20, 1916 – "The Southern Michigan Telephone Company are preparing to publish a directory of the Quincy and Algansee subscribers. If you are contemplating installing a telephone, it would be well to make sure your name is listed in the Telephone Directory at once. Call Mrs. Mohr, chief operator, Quincy.

C.H. Chase Has Thrilling Experience In Florida

The St. Petersburg, (Fla.) evening Independent of April 4th gives an account of a thrilling experience, of which Chas. H. Chase, of Quincy, who has been spending the winter there, was one of the participants. Mr. Chase, in company with a party of 16 Odd Fellows of St. Petersburg, chartered a small boat for a trip by water to Bradentown, for a fraternal visit to the Odd Fellows lodge of that place the evening of April 3rd. They started on return trip at 12:30 o'clock at night. Half an hour later, at the mouth of the Manatee river, fire was discovered in the engine room, and while those in charge of the boat were fighting the fire with extinguishers an explosion occurred causing the flames to spread rapidly. It soon became apparent that the boat would be destroyed, so the captain supplied all the men with life preservers and assisted them in adjusting them properly. In fifteen minutes after the fire broke out it was necessary for the passengers and crew to take to the water, all swimming to the beacons (which mark the channel of the river) about half a mile away, which all reached in safety and succeeded in climbing on to it. The narrative says the space on the beacon was narrow and the men were uncomfortable, as well as wet and cold, but they stuck it out for six long hours, until rescued by another boat which was making a morning trip, and taken back to St. Petersburg. Fortunately no lives were lost and no serious results followed those who were in the wreck. The boat was a total loss.

April 27, 1916 -- Chevrolet cars are becoming quite popular in this section. Frank Francisco, local agent, having sold cars of late to the following Quincy people; Dr. W.D. Campbell, Mrs. A.L. Mallory, John Knecht, Ebba Corless and Rev. F.O. Fish."

Joe Demorest and John Showalter had a rather exciting experience while returning from Coldwater last Friday afternoon in a Ford car owned by C.A. Bishop. Demorest was driving the car and they were going at a fast clip coming down the hill this side of the old brick yard near the township line, when the car turned turtle and brought up against a telephone pole, doing considerable damage to the car. Fortunately the young men miraculously escaped injury and were able to walk home. The car was taken to the Hawes shop in Coldwater for repairs.

Fun Facts About Late Library Books

\$345.19

According to the Guiness World Records, this is the world's largest fine for an overdue library book. This amount accrued at \$.02 per day since April 19, 1955 for a poetry book titled Days and Deeds checked out from the Kewanee Public Library in IL. When found in an elderly woman's house, her daughter returned the book and paid the fine.

221 Years

George Washington took out The Law of Nations by Emmerich De Vattel five months into his presidency from the historic New York Society Library, yet failed to bring it back. After being 221 years overdue, it was returned by Mount Vernon staff in 2010 according to magazine website TheWeek.com



Michigan Activity Pass Program

The Branch District Library – Quincy Branch and the other five library branches – are again participating in the **Michigan Activity Pass Program.** This program offers library cardholders a one-day pass to explore – at no cost – hundreds of Michigan's state parks, historic sites, cultural attractions, campgrounds and recreation areas simply by visiting their local library or the Michigan Activity Pass website.

Started by The Library Network, the Michigan Activity Pass program is a new component for the third- year of MI Big Green Gym, a partnership between Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and the Michigan Recreations and Park Association that encourages Michigan residents to use the state's parks and recreation facilities to increase physical activity.

The Michigan Activity Pass will enable library cardholders to print a pass, either from home or their local library, that is valid for one-time entry into any Michigan state park or recreation area and more than 100 participating cultural institutions, including many museums, for up to one week.
