Quincy Library Board Notes

In February, children's books were purchased from the "Grandma Mishler's Fund for Young Readers" on the anniversary of Jenny Mishler's death. Up to 5 books, not to exceed \$100, are purchased each year from this fund. What a wonderful legacy from her family.

The library urns were painted by Judy Dobson and Teddy Sinclair filled them with flowers purchased with money from the Quincy Chamber of Commerce. All was in place for President Lincoln's speech from our library steps on May 27th to kick off the "Civil War Days" program at Heritage Park in Coldwater.

The annual NIKA auction netted \$1700 that was donated to Quincy Township toward repair of the eaves system at the library. Extensive repairs are needed and the repairs must be in the same manner as they are now since the library is an historical building.

At the annual township meeting, Carol Ludlow and Bonnie Frick were reappointed to a 3-year term on the Quincy Library Board ending in 2019.

101.301 items

The number of items returned on the Chicago Public Library's first fine amnesty day in more than two decades. While most of the items were three to five years overdue, the latest item was from 1934! estimated value of the items returned was \$2,035,473 according to the urban Libraries Council.

Up to 100 or more points

Unpaid fines can actually hurt a patron's credit score. When a library turns an unpaid balance over to a collection agency, they in turn may report the balance to a major credit reporting agency. A collection account can lower a credit score by 100 points or more when shown on a credit report.

How to Get Your Child to Read

Does your child have trouble reading? Here are some ways to help him/her improve and learn to enjoy books.

- Find a book on a topic of special interest to your child - pets, ballet, soccer, for example.
- ** Pick one day a week to visit the library and let him select his own books.
- ** Read to him for 15 minutes a day, and always stop at an exciting place in the story.
- ** Encourage him to read aloud to you or to a younger brother or sister.
- Subscribe to a good children's magazine, such as Highlights, Clubhouse, Zoo Books, Sports Illustrated for to a group of 20 during Michigan Week in May Kids, etc.
- ** Teach your child how to use the dictionary to look up word meanings.
- ** Limit TV viewing.
