The worst blizzard in Michigan occurred January 26, 1978, when up to two feet of snow fell and was whipped by sixty-to seventy-five-mile-perhour winds into ten-foot drifts. The storm killed twenty and left 400,000 stranded along Michigan's highways. Hundreds of schools closed including MSU for only the third time in its 125year history. 50 out of our 83 counties declared snow emergencies and President Carter declared Michigan a national disaster area.


Join us for this amazing program. Kotcher's book "Donut Dolly" will be available and refreshments will be served.

Did You Know these Library Facts??

- Public libraries feature prominently in famous scenes from many well-known movies, including Ghostbusters, The Day After Tomorrow, Philadelphia, Breakfast at Tiffany's and Citizen Kane.
- The lions that lounge outside the beautiful New York Public Library's main building at Fifth Ave. and 42nd Street are named Patience and Fortitude.
- America's first lending library was established in 1731, Philadelphia, by Benjamin Franklin. It was a paid subscription-based service, but paved the way for the library systems we use in North America today.
- Toronto has less than 3 million people, but its public library system is the busiest in North America by circulation, with 32 million books being lent out in 2010. Compare that to New York City's circulation of 24 million volumes, supported by a population of 8.2 million.
- Some famous librarians throughout history include Jacob Grimm, Mao Zedong, Golda Meir, Laura Bush, Marcel Proust, Melvil Dewey, and Lewis Carroll.
- Public libraries act as the number one providers of Internet usage for families without Internet access at home, work or school.
- There are more than 30,000 registered Little Free Libraries around the world!
- The Future Library project in Oslo, Norway is growing the trees that will be needed to
 publish 100 books 100 years from now.

Michigan's First 3 Railroads -

- Erie & Kalamazoo—1837; Michigan's first rail service ran thirty-five miles between Adrian and Toledo at a top speed of ten m.p.h. The railroad was also the first in the country to be built west of the Allegheny Mountains.
- Michigan Southern—1843; Monroe to Hillsdale
- 3. Michigan Central-1846; Detroit to Kalamazoo valley

Michigan's First 3 Major Roads-

- In 1816 the state's first road was started leading from Detroit to Pontiac and Saginaw. This military road later became parts of Woodward Avenue, M-1, U.S. 10 and I-75.
- 2. In 1825 a military road was built to link Detroit and Chicago.
- In 1827 a stagecoach-working road was completed through the black Swamp to link Detroit and Ohio.
