available and 24/7 wifi outside the building for after hours or anytime use.


Patrons have online access to thousands of great digital books, videos, music and more through Hoopla and OverDrive, and we encourage you to use these services right from your home. Call the

#### The Quincy Branch Library memorial program has been

in place for a number of years which offers individuals the opportunity to give toward book purchases *In Memory of* someone special or *In Honor of* someone special or a special occasion.

Checks to the **Quincy Library Foundation** can be mailed to 11 N. Main Street, Quincy, MI 49082 with information containing the individual's name and who the gift is from. Please provide a name and address of a family member and the library will send a notification card to the family indicating that a gift has been given in their loved one's name.

New books are purchased for the library collection according to need, but we gladly welcome subject matters or titles also that reflect the person in whose name the gift is being given. Book plaques are added inside the book front cover before being displayed on library shelves.

Gifts can also be designated to our Project Fund, which is used for library building needs. Previous projects have supported new lighting, a book drop and shelving.





The inception of Lakeview Cemetery:

"The first board of health was appointed at an annual township meeting held in 1839, and consisted of Peter M. Newberry, James Smith, Bartholomew Hewett, Ellis Russell, and John Broughton. At a meeting of the board of health, convened at the house of Joseph Berry, March 7, 1840, they contracted with said Berry for one acre of ground for burial purposes, at \$30. They also contracted with John Broughton to clear the same, and make a good and sufficient post and rail fence around it for the consideration of \$30, said fence to be six rails high, and to make a permanent gate six feet wide, on the west side, and to be done by the 6th of April following. At the annual town meeting of 1840, \$60 was voted to pay for the ground, and the clearing and fencing of the same. January 21, 1841, the work was examined, found done according to contract, and accepted. This was the old burying ground.

May 23, 1885, the board of health purchased from Enos G. Berry four acres of ground, and at the same date, from Timothy Howe and D.B. Purinton, a like amount, all of it for the consideration of \$50 per acre. This plat is situated upon section 21 southeast, one half-mile from the village proper, and within the corporate limits. It is described in the survey as follows: 'Beginning upon the north and south quarter line of section 21 in Quincy township, 12 81/100 south of the north quarter post, and running thence west at right angles, to said line, four chains; thence south parallel with said line, eight chains; thence east at right angles to said line, eight chains; thence west at right angles to said line, four chains to the place of beginning, and containing eight acres.'

*Upon completion of necessary improvements the bodies were removed from the old burying ground before mentioned to the new cemetery."* (History of Branch County, Michigan 1879)

#### Quincy Library Civil War Flags-

These original flags of the same battery have been restored by a Detroit Institute of Arts Conservator.

The silk flag, with 44 liquid gold painted stars, was flown by the G.A.R. C.O. Loomis Post, No. 2. The Loomis name was elected by Quincy's G.A.R. Post in honor of the Loomis Battery, a light artillery battery which originated in Coldwater, Michigan. This fighting Unit was led by Captain Cyrus Loomis in 1861 and was recognized as one of the best, with the reputation of being where the fighting was the toughest.

The Federal flag is of wool bunting and has 13 stripes and 22 cotton appliquéd stars. The two sides are mirror image of each other. All stitching was done by hand using handspun cotton-sewing threads. It is believed it would have been sewn about 1820 around the time Alabama and Maine, formerly part of Massachusetts, came into the Union. Its' history is unknown, but Branch County had many settlers in the 1830s and 40s who came from New England.

The number of Branch County men who fell in action or died in Civil War service totaled 335. These men were termed "The Sacrificed".

The Civil War era flags, swords and muskets came to be housed in the Quincy Public Library in 1929. The handwritten library board minutes noted three gentlemen represented the soon to be disbanded G.A.R. Post, which by then included the Spanish American War veterans. The library board was asked to act as custodians of the flags, providing that the township furnish a case to keep them in a proper place. That case was built over the library entry stairway and remained there until 2008 when the library Advisory Board noticed the flags were deteriorating badly and began a preservation project. The flags were restored by Textile Conservator, Howard Sutcliffe, from the Detroit Institute of Arts in 2009-10. The total hours of restoration was 230.
