The Quincy Branch Library memorial program has been in place for a number of years which offers individuals the opportunity to give toward book purchases in Memory of or in Honor of someone special or a special occasion.

Please provide a name and address of a family member and the library will send a notification card to the family indicating that a gift has been given in their loved one's name.

New books are purchased for the library collection according to need, but we gladly welcome subject matters or titles also that reflect the person in whose name the gift is being given. Book plaques are added inside the book front cover before being displayed on library shelves.

Gifts can also be designated to our Project Fund which is used for library building needs. Previous projects have supported new lighting, a book drop and shelving.



#### **MARKET 1858**

In 2017 the former village manager, Eric Zuzga, met with a company to design the northeast block of downtown Quincy. Part of that design was an idea that was working in Muskegon, called the Western Market. The Village got to designing our own market area, where the previous courtyard was. The name, although market is a regular term, we wanted to incorporate something about Quincy, with that 1858 is the year the Village of Quincy was incorporated and we thought it was perfect.

This program is designed to attract small businesses and create retail shopping in Quincy's Central Business District. This program offers an opportunity to sell and showcase products and services of interest to area residents and tourists. There are currently six sheds, a gazebo and one double bathroom located at Market 1858.

Some of the objectives for Market 1858 are the following:

- Economic Gardening- Business/Job Creation
- Increased Tourism and Closer Partnership with CVB
- School Partnership to Promote Programs and Entrepreneurship
- Traffic Generator for Existing Downtown Businesses
- Aesthetic Improvement and Better Use of Village Owned Property
- Improved Event and Public Space
- Downtown and Village Park Connection

There are currently three sheds taken; MiMi's Creations, Styles by Sheena Rhue, and Sarah G. Designs/Tia's Treasurers. A lot of interest for the sheds has risen from opening the market in May, for new vendors to fill the remaining three sheds. The season for the sheds runs from May through October, with a bonus week in December in conjunction with Quincy Lights festival. There are set hours of operation, Thursday from 5 PM to 7 PM, Friday and Saturday from 10 AM to 4 PM.

To create more traffic flow in the market area and downtown, we have added acoustic musicians in the gazebo on select Saturdays, as well as having Crockett's BBQ (locally owned) join on select Saturdays for those wishing to get a bite to eat while out shopping. Local businesses are also taking advantage of the space, for instance Refuge Coffee holds worship nights once a month, but have grown out of the space and have asked to utilize the gazebo and green space.

We look forward to watching the market grow and bring business to our village!

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### Quincy Historical Society works to preserve rich history

In an effort to preserve Quincy's rich history, Quincy's Historical Society members established the Historical Society Museum, which features a variety of items from the 1800s to present day.

The museum building, located at 10 E. Jefferson St., was erected in 1874 by a Seventh Day Adventist congregation and served as a place of worship for other religious groups for decades. The building was constructed for an impressive \$1,700 and is the only brick church and one of the oldest structures in the village.

From the 1970s to the 2000s, the building served as a storage facility and quickly fell into disrepair. It was not until 2002 that the village purchased the building with the intentions of establishing a museum.

Six years later, the Quincy Historical Society was incorporated, and the next year, they were federally recognized as a non-profit charitable organization.

Prior to the museum opening to the public, several renovations had to be completed, including the walls, floors, doors and windows.

"All the windows are original to the building," Karen Hargreave, of the historical society, said. "They were taken out one-by-one and restored by Charles Rockhold."

The renovations were complete, and on Aug. 27, 2010, the museum hosted a grand opening with hundreds of community members in attendance.


Inside the museum, one can expect to see original displays from Watt's Drug Store, Quincy Fire Department, schools, several factories and stores, veteran's wear and many more unique items to Quincy.

At the back of the building on a stage sits a restored alert fire hose cart used by the Quincy Fire Department in the 1800s. The cart was used during weekend race events, parades and banquets.

The first yearbook for Quincy High School, published in 1910, is also on display along with several articles of clothing worn by local women of the early settlement days, Star of the West Mills and the old cement plant artifacts and much more.
